## 2017 NZQA Results

### Above the National Average!

2017 was the best year ever for Wainuiomata High School students and their NCEA results. Confirmed results indicate the following:

<b>NCEA Achievement</b>	<b>Wainuiomata High School</b>	<b>National Average</b>
Level One (Overall)	79%	74.6%
Level Two (Overall)	72.5% <small>(the closest we have been to the National Average)</small>	78.5%
Level One (Maori)	81.4%	64.2%
Level Three (Maori)	62.5%	56.7%
Level One (Male)	77.2%	70.2%
Level One (Female)	81.4%	79.2%

These are stunning results and reflect the hard work and good choices our students, whanau, teachers and support staff made last year. Congratulations to the students, whanau and community who supported our young people.

We are incredibly proud of these results and will continue to work hard and encourage our Rangatahi to be the best they possibly can and produce the best results they can.

We interviewed many of our successful students and their comments around the reasons for their success include the following:

- Help from whanau
- Good relationships with Manaaki Teachers, who helped set goals and monitor them
- High expectations from teachers
- Having teachers who are passionate about teaching.
