



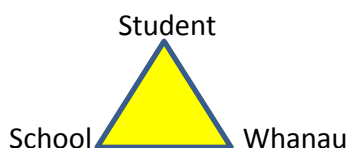
MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Our team not only got to play the game, but also experience a karakia from your kaumatua, a minute’s silence in respect and the most amazing support from the crowd. We can only apologise for having narrowly won the game!

Please pass on our appreciation to your Head of Sport, kaumatua and students. We owe your boys a great feed when they are next playing here.”

Our students are amazing young people. It is great to see them live our school values and be recognised for doing so.

13 Reasons Why

As you may have heard, Netflix has released Season 2 of the popular teen drama *13 Reasons Why*. We’re sending this special notice so parents, guardians, whānau and other support people are aware the show is out and we know some viewers may be distressed while or after viewing it.

The show is about a 17-year-old girl, Hannah Baker, who dies by suicide. Season 1 explored the 'reasons' why Hannah felt she had to kill herself and Season 2 features a trial between her parents and her school trying to decide who's to blame.

Most young people may not be distressed after watching the show but the issues it explores do affect young New Zealanders. Statistics show 20% of viewers will have experienced a mental health problem in the last year, 1/3 female viewers and 1/5 male viewers will have been sexually assaulted and many will have been bereaved by suicide. For these people, viewing *13 Reasons Why* may be a deeply distressing or traumatising experience.

Senior Formal

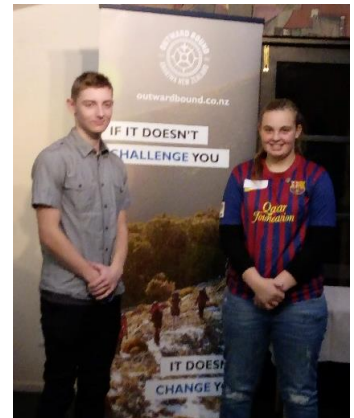
This Saturday is our Senior Formal at Te Papa. We have sold over 180 tickets and look forward to
